

Training Cost

Open/Public Virtual Trainings: \$300/person

We offer this training to the public every 1-2 months. The class is limited to 20 participants, and is \$300/person. The cost includes the virtual live, interactive, full day training lead by 2 experts in the field of supported parenting. In addition, each attendee receives a 60-page training guide, live Q&A with trainers, interaction with peers around the world doing similar work, a certificate of attendance, and a 30-page toolkit, full of items from the training as well as additional resources.

If you need Social Work CEUs for anyone attending the training, those can be added on for an additional cost of \$65/person.
